















Oxford University Church Hosts Armenian Vespers to Commemorate the Holy Martyrs of the Armenian Genocide

On the evening of 24 April, a solemn and deeply moving Armenian Vespers service was held at the University Church of St Mary the Virgin in Oxford, marking the 110th anniversary of the Armenian Genocide to commemorate the Holy Martyrs. Armenian Divine service is one of the ancient Christian traditions with specific features and unique choir.

The service began with a welcome address by the Revd Canon Dr William Lamb, Vicar of the University Church, who reflected on the Church's historic role as a symbol of peace and reconciliation. He highlighted its involvement in significant religious events, including the trials of the Oxford Martyrs during the Reformation. The service was conducted by Bishop Hovakim Manukyan, Primate of the Armenian Church in the United Kingdom and Ireland. In his reflection, he acknowledged the solemn memory of 24 April, while reminding the faithful that, as Christians, "we are people of the Resurrection."

The event was organized by the University Church and the White Cross Foundation with the active participation of the Armenian community in Oxford.
